As well as celebrating special events in their lives, like births and marriages, Hindus also celebrate special events to worship gods or remember important stories.


One of the most popular Hindu festivals is Divali. Divali takes place in October or November and is the start of the Hindu New Year. It is sometimes known as the Festival of Lights. Divali celebrates the story of a prince called Rama.

Prince Rama was the son of a great king. He lived with his beautiful wife Sita in a grand palace. He was supposed to be king himself one day but he had an evil stepmother who didn't like him.



As well as celebrating the story of Rama and Sita, Divali is also a festival for worshipping the goddess Lakshmi. Lakshmi is the goddess of wealth and prosperity so during Divali, Hindus pray that she will bless them in the coming year.







The festival of Divali lasts for 5 days. Hindu families light divas and put them in their windows, just like the people in the story who celebrated when Rama and Sita came home.







There are lots of other ways Hindus celebrate Divali too, such as giving cards and presents to each other, eating special foods, wearing new clothes and having fireworks.











Families also create rangoli patterns on the floor to welcome the goddess Lakshmi into their homes. The patterns are usually made from coloured flour, rice or powders. They can be very tricky to make!
