Buddhist Festivals: Why is Buddhism special?



Buddhists give offerings and thank the Buddha in temples.





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Unlike some other religions, Buddhists do not worship one all-powerful creator god, or quite different to Christianity or Islam, for example.



Let's find out about how this affects the ways in which Buddhists practise their religion...







The most significant figure in Buddhism is a man called Siddhartha Gautama. He was a prince who spent his life learning how to bring about an end to suffering in the world. One day, while meditating, he achieved 'enlightenment' and became the Buddha. Buddhism is based on the teachings of the Buddha.





When Buddhists worship, they do not give thanks to a god or ask god for help. Instead, they pay respect to the Buddha, thanking him for his teachings. They may visit a temple to pray and to leave offerings at the feet of statues of the Buddha.








Buddhists **meditate** to clear their minds, better understand the teachings of the Buddha and to become 'enlightened'.








Buddhists believe in **reincarnation**, or rebirth. This means that rather than going to heaven or paradise after death, as Christians and Muslims believe, they believe that they will be born again in the body of another living thing. Even among Buddhists, there are lots of different ideas about how this happens.




This symbol is called 'the endless knot'. It represents the ideas of rebirth and karma.





The yin yang is often used to represent the idea of karma.



Buddhists also believe in **karma**. This means that there is a consequence for every thought or action. If someone has bad thoughts or does bad things, it will have a bad effect on them when they are reincarnated or reborn. If they have good thoughts and do good things, their next life will be a better one.
